Biographical History

Biographical information is not available about Francis J. Jack. He was either an archaeological researcher, or an archaeology enthusiast, though he appears to have never self-published or contributed significantly to published work on the subject.

Scope and Content

Collection consists of Francis Jack's notes on articles, as well as clippings from published magazines. One set of Jack's notes are observations made on a September 1899 trip to Wupatki. The other set of notes comments on Victor Mindeleff's "A Study of Pueblo Architecture," published in the 1886-87 Annual Report of the Bureau of Ethnology. Clippings from an 1900 issue of *Wide World Magazine* include articles such as, "What I Saw at the Snake Dance," "How Colenbrander Fought the Zulu," and "Adventures in Search of Wild Cacti." Also included is a clipping from *A Neglected People*, which includes several articles.
