Museum of Northern Arizona Docent Training Course, Fall-Spring 2017-2018

Tuesdays, 10:00 – 12:30 PM Field trips will be announced

The Museum of Northern Arizona's Docent Training Program gives trainees an overview of the Museum's mission, programs and research activities. It will give you the experience to share that knowledge with Museum visitors in a variety of ways that include Museum Highlights Tours, Peaks and Bungalows Presentations, tours for school groups and special tours on more focused topics. This course is only the beginning of your training and it is hoped that following your certification as a docent you will participate in ongoing educational opportunities such as the docent led Peer-to-Peer programs.

Completion of this course does not guarantee your certification as a docent for the Museum of Northern Arizona but it will give you a solid foundation for that certification. To be certified as a docent you must complete this course as well as 75% of the Docent and Mentor Checklist activities by April 1, 2018. Missing more than three classes without good cause will jeopardize your completion of the course. Your mentor, an experienced docent will work with you and assist you in completing the required activities.

Program Outcomes

By the completion of their training period, March 2018, docent trainees will be:

- 1. Able to demonstrate a general understanding of the topics covered by the mission and programs of the Museum of Northern Arizona
- 2. Able to demonstrate the ability to present public programs and tours that are an essential component of a docent's role at the Museum
- 3. Able to lead a Highlights tour by the end of their training period
- 4. Able to lead, or at a minimum assist with, other tours and the most frequently offered children's programs
- Familiar with, at a minimum, other programs and puppet shows, some of which may be done only during cultural festivals

Course Activities

Classes with include lectures and discussion and many classes will include guest speakers who are experts on the topic. In addition to attending the class you are required to read the assigned materials that will give you a good background on the topics and additional books and materials are available to you in the Docent Library. At the beginning of each class there will be a one question, one minute quiz drawn from the reading assignment for the day.

The course includes some field trip and they will be announced. Attending the field trips is required.

In addition to completing the required activities of the Docent/Mentor Checklist you should consider signing up to give talks at the Peaks and Bungalows for practice. Attending Peer-to-Peer meetings will also provide a wealth of information.

Class convenes in the Harvey Branigar Auditorium. Most classes will be held in the museum galleries following Power Point presentations in the Auditorium. Each class will include gallery content and touring techniques. Additional class hours may be scheduled if needed. Following completion of the class several field trips will be arranged including trips to the Easton Collection Center and research center campus, Colton House, Grand Canyon National Park, Wupatki National Monument, and the Hopi Mesas and the Navajo Nation. Also, in the spring, mid-April, we will schedule a class on the use of the Jaime Major Golightly Courtyard and the plant communities of northern Arizona.
